Margaret Verb - Past Tense, and they Verb - Past Tense their way against the Noun, resisting it with Verb - Present ends in ING delight for about Number minutes longer, when suddenly the clouds united over their Part of Body, and a driving rain set full in their Part of Body -- Chagrined and surprised, they were obliged, though Adverb, to turn back, for no Noun was nearer than their own Location. One Noun however remained for them, to which the Noun of the moment gave more than usual Noun; it was that of Verb - Present ends in ING with all possible Noun down the steep side of the hill which led immediately to their garden Location.

They Verb - Past Tense off. Marianne had at first the Noun, but a false step brought her Adverb to the ground; and Margaret, unable to Verb - Base Form herself to assist her, was Adverb hurried along, and Verb - Past Tense the bottom in safety.
